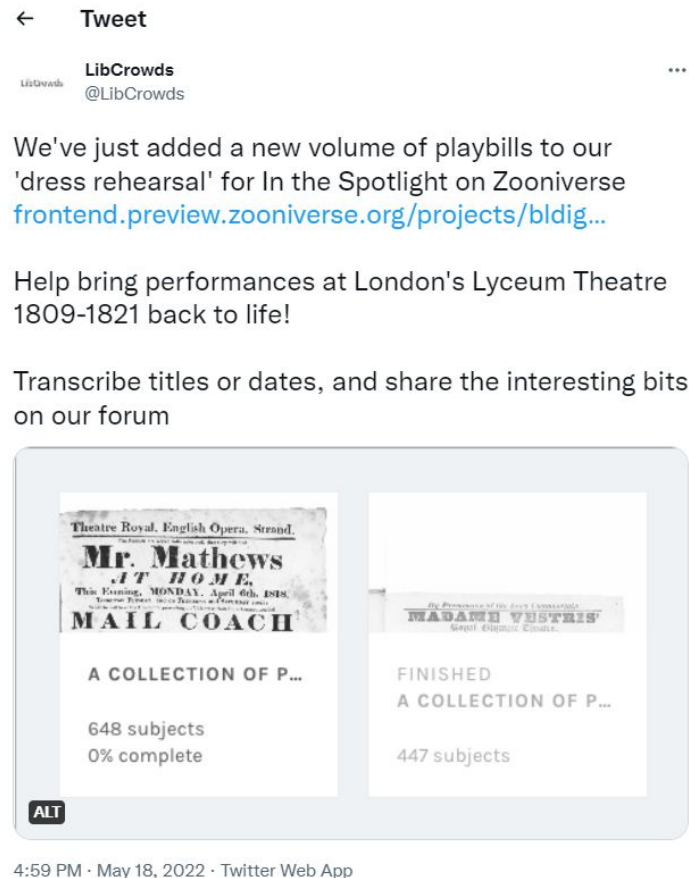

In 2014, the British Library commissioned IIF work on what became the Universal Viewer

The Universal Viewer was designed to replace multiple existing viewers on the British Library websites

LibCrowds is a platform for hosting experimental crowdsourcing projects aimed at improving access to the diverse collections held at the British Library.

In the Spotlight on LibCrowds.com

- Pybossa backend manages the validation of results
- Customised interface with Vue.js
- Results are available immediately
- Metadata added to item viewer by Collections Metadata team
- Over 2,800 registered volunteers internationally
- Over 265,000 contributions completed 157 sets of playbills.
- When live, has thousands of contributions weekly
- But - **hard to maintain without Research Software Engineers**

My institution uses IIIF (<http://iiif.io/>) to publish collection items. In the past, we've used the manifests to load items into a crowdsourcing interface for page-by-page (or canvas-by-canvas in IIIF terms) tasks. Using IIIF this way means we can draw images and metadata directly from the main access server and don't need to store them separately for crowdsourcing, which reduced our costs at the time but mightn't be as much of an issue for Zooniverse projects. It also means curators can easily add new items to tasks via the IIIF manifest URL.

We haven't had the resources to maintain a standalone site, so we've looked into moving In the Spotlight onto Zooniverse, the well-known citizen science and citizen history platform.

If you're familiar with how things worked here, we'd especially welcome your feedback as we move things over to Zooniverse.

For now, we have a 'mark and transcribe titles' task and a 'transcribe the date' task. In future, we could add 'genre classification', or ask folk to record the location of theatres (especially in 'miscellaneous' volumes, or in locations where e.g. the local Theatre Royal had different locations over time.

Drafting documentation to share at the IIIF conference....

1. Get the manifest link

I copied the manifest address I wanted, in this case from: 'A collection of playbills from Lyceum Theatre 1809-1821.'

A note for using British Library manifest links:

The 'IIIF' logo on the 'share' dialogue has the manifest link.

Copying that manifest link gives you a long version e.g.

https://api.bl.uk/metadata/iiif/ark:/81055/vdc_100022589296.0x000002/manifest.json?

But I only need the second half of the URL so I chopped off the part up to the '=' sign to get:

https://api.bl.uk/metadata/iiif/ark:/81055/vdc_100022589296.0x000002/manifest.json

2. Log into Zooniverse (this assumes you have appropriate permissions on the project)

3. Go to the special link to import IIIF manifests as Zooniverse subject sets: <https://www.zooniverse.org/lab/xxx/subject-sets/iiif> - your project will have a unique number that you will need to copy into the 'xxx' part of this link.

4. Paste my IIIF manifest link into the box

But the resulting annotations from Zooniverse can be hard to use 'as is'. Do you want to learn how to turn Zooniverse data into something you can use in catalogues, on web pages or in research? Then this session is for you! Zooniverse: how to download and analyse your task annotations will introduce the widely used Zooniverse platform and the services it offers, and share new developments in using the Library's IIIF items on Zooniverse. Then we get hands-on! You'll learn how to process your annotations to obtain a clean and readable spreadsheet for your project.
